NOTICE OF INVESTIGATION – GUILLAIN-BARRE SYNDROME – CORONAVIRUS DISEASE 2019 (COVID-19) VACCINES

Section 196G of the

Veterans' Entitlements Act 1986

The Repatriation Medical Authority (the Authority) gives notice under section 196G of the Veterans' Entitlements Act 1986 (the VEA) that, pursuant to subsection 196B(7A) of the VEA, it intends to carry out an investigation in respect of coronavirus disease 2019 (COVID-19) vaccines as a factor in Guillain-Barre syndrome.

This investigation will be carried out in the context of Statements of Principles Instrument Nos. 23 & 24 of 2018, as amended, concerning Guillain-Barre syndrome.

The Authority invites the following persons and organisations to make written submissions to the Authority in respect of the investigation:

- a person eligible to make a claim for pension under Part II or Part IV of the VEA;
a person eligible to make a claim for compensation under section 319 of the Military Rehabilitation and Compensation Act 2004 (the MRCA);
an organisation representing veterans, Australian mariners, members of the Forces, members of the Peacekeeping Forces, members within the meaning of the MRCA, or their dependants;
the Repatriation Commission or the Military Rehabilitation and Compensation Commission; and
a person having expertise in a field relevant to the investigation.

The Authority will hold its first meeting for the purposes of this investigation on 12 April 2022.
