

NOTICE OF INVESTIGATION

Section 196G of the

Veterans' Entitlements Act 1986

The Repatriation Medical Authority (the Authority) gives notice under section 196G of the *Veterans' Entitlements Act 1986* (the VEA) that it intends to carry out an investigation under subsection 196B(7) of the VEA to review the contents of Statements of Principles Instrument Nos. 95 & 96 of 2007 concerning **malignant neoplasm of the bladder**.

The Authority invites the following persons and organisations to make written submissions to the Authority in respect of the investigation:

- a person eligible to make a claim for pension under Part II or Part IV of the *Veterans' Entitlements Act* 1986;
- a person eligible to make a claim for compensation under section 319 of the *Military Rehabilitation and Compensation Act 2004* ['the MRCA'];
- an organisation representing veterans, Australian mariners, members of the Forces, members of the Peacekeeping Forces, members within the meaning of the MRCA, or their dependants;
- the Repatriation Commission or the Military Rehabilitation and Compensation Commission; and
- · a person having expertise in a field relevant to the investigation.

The Authority previously gave notice under section 196G of the VEA that, pursuant to subsection 196B(7A), it intended to carry out an investigation in respect of **ionising radiation** and **exposure to sulphur mustard or nitrogen mustard**, as factors in **malignant neoplasm of the bladder**. This new Notice of Investigation will incorporate the previously advertised focussed review which appeared in the Government Notices Gazette of 3 November 2010.

The Authority will hold its first meeting for the purposes of this investigation on 22 February 2011.

Under the VEA, the Authority is required to find out whether there is new information available about how malignant neoplasm of the bladder may be suffered or contracted, or death from malignant neoplasm of the bladder may occur, and the extent to which malignant neoplasm of the bladder or death from malignant neoplasm of the bladder may be war-caused, defence-caused, a service injury, a service disease or a service death. Persons and organisations wishing to make a submission should obtain a copy of the RMA Submission Guidelines from the RMA website [www.rma.gov.au] or by contacting the RMA Secretariat at the address or telephone number below.

All submissions must be in writing and received by the Authority at the address below no later

than 14 February 2011.
